As followers of Christ, our goal is to become more like Him with each passing day. I don't know about you, but there are times when it is as

though I can *literally* hear my flesh crying out in protest, when in a challenging situation, I choose to respond in a manner which reflects that "I have been crucified with Christ. It is no longer I who live, but Christ who lives in me. And the life I now



live in the flesh I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave Himself for me." Galatians 2:20 (English Standard Version).

The Apostle Paul reminds us: "Therefore, if anyone is in Christ, he is a new creation; old things have passed away; behold, all things have become new." 2 Corinthians 5:17 (New King James Version).


If we pray to be more like Christ, get ready - because at the most inopportune time, He will present us with 'opportunities' that will enable us to practice being just like Him!
